The Foundation views the distribution of Brahmi saplings as a symbolic step linking
















By concluding the event with a call for continued commitment to nature, HULAHUL FOUNDATION reinforced its vision of fostering harmony between people and the environment.

MEERA SHENOY: TRANSFORMING DISABILITY INTO ABILITY THROUGH YOUTH4JOBS

INTERVIEW BY TANISHKA UERMA



"Skilling an individual is like nurturing a chrysalis, it opens into a butterfly and flies on its own"

n an interview with The HULAHUL Times, Meera Shenoy, a social entrepreneur and a ray of hope for youth with disabilities, unfolded the various phases of her life from working into corporate sector, business media, television to founding Youth4Jobs and equipping youth with disabilities with cutting-edge technology and helping them find jobs. She was born in a joint family in Chennai and had an unwavering value-based upbringing. She recollects her family being a generous one with values of helping people in need. However, She says, "I never had keen interest in doing social work but I was surrounded by family members for whom giving to the needy was an intrinsic value".

Upon asking about any moment in her life that drove her into the direction of social work she shared that her work trajectory led her into social work. she mentions that during her work days in television she would write about and capture the lives of the people in villages but this would not give her the satisfaction and she would always say "I want to do something hands on", and that's when her tireless journey of social work began by setting up and leading Employment Generation and Marketing Mission (EGMM) in 2004. Mrs. Shenoy

considers this as a major milestone as it positively influenced the government policies with establishment of around 100 training centres in the state of Andhra Pradesh for young men and women who later got different kinds of jobs. While establishing Youth4Jobs in 2012, she was persistent to do something different from her previous works and that's when she decided to transform the lives of the youth with a prevision expressed as, "When you catch them at 18 years and train them, you not only secure their lives for next 50 years bu

t, also ward off them from social ills likesmoking, substance abuse etcetera", remarks Meera Shenoy.

On being asked about her rationale and vision behind focusing particularly on youth with disabilities, she shared some striking International Labour Organisation (ILO) statistics with an 80% far-reaching presence of Persons with Disabilities in developing countries like India and the unfortunate observation about the neglected position of persons with Disability. Thus, she decided to work for the betterment of the rural youth with disability. The vision of Youth4Jobs have remained the same over years that aims to help youth with disability to be poverty free, independent, and confident through the pathway of tech training and livelihood creation.

Till date, Youth4Jobs has been successful in impacting the lives of 6,10,000+ youth with disability and over 1712+ corporate partnerships.



Later in the interview she talked about her two flagship Portal and programs SwarajAbility and NotJustArt and the vision behind it. Meera Shenoy shared that the



inspiration to launch SwarajAbility came from the motivating words of the judges when they received MIT Asia Inclusion award in 2019 who asked them why don't they open a tech platform keeping in mind the kind of control they have on demand and the supply. And then, after coming back to India, Mrs. Shenoy launched the SwarajAbility platform through the active inclusion and partnership with IIT Hyderabad, CII, IBDN, and ILO keeping youth with disability at the pedestal. This inclusive tech platform assisting in 11 languages has transformed the lives of youth with over 2 lakhs registered on it.

NotJustArt is another major flagship venture on which Meera Shenoy started working on her own realising the importance of honing one's creative skills alongside tech skilling. To support NotJustArt, United Nations and UNESCO partnered with it which gave the major push to the whole idea behind this creative venture.

Youth4Jobs also focuses on the empowerment of the women with disabilities as they are trapped in multiple layers of vulnerability. The organisation focuses on making this burden of vulnerability light by skilling them and enabling them to make money and sustain themselves and their families. Therefore, empowering them economically and socially. Mrs. Shenoy shared a story of a woman named Lulu who was severely disabled hence was not getting a job. However, sincere efforts of Youth4Jobs manged to get her placed as a vendor in JP Morgan Chase.

Since its inception in 2012, Youth4Jobs has changed the lives of people who were earlier looked down upon as liabilities by turning them into assets and giving them confidence and selfesteem.

Notwithstanding the praiseworthy work that Youth4Jobs continues to do, they too face some challenges especially when it comes to changing attitude of persons with disability about themselves and others attitude about them. People usually treat disability as a curse and finds it hard to deal with it. Also, she highlights that there is a huge digital divide that creates issues in rural skilling. However, it has been more than a decade and Youth4Jobs has been successful in combating challenges like these.

Though, Meera Shenoy and her organisation have received many international and national awards like TALHero India Award 2024, National Award for Empowerment of Person with Disability in 2018 and many more, but her altruistic soul finds solace in stories like these that they get to witness and experience on a day-to-day basis. Meera Shenoy says that awards for her are a sign that they are going in the right direction and gives motivation to her team to work even more harder. For her, "The feeling of a youth with disability being recognised is unparalleled to any award in the world", says her.



Finally, when asked about an advice she would like to give to the young entrepreneurs, she said "I advise them to not give up and be persistent on the path of their ideation, if you think your idea is great then don't give up even if it doesn't give tangible results".

Meera Shenoy's work journey is truly inspirational for the youth; it is a perfect blend of practicality and compassion along with right ideations and intent.

MIXED TREND IN KHARIF SOWING: GAINS IN RICE, MAIZE, SUGARCANE; LOSSES IN OILSEEDS, COTTON

he total area u n d e r Kharif crops in India has reached 1,039.81 lakh hectares as of August 15, 2025, according to the Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare. This is 37.39 lakh hectares more than the same period last year, showing a clear rise in cultivation.



Rice continues to lead the season. with sowing covering 398.59 lakh hectares, up by 35.67 lakh hectares from 2024, thanks to good monsoon rains. Coarse cereals also grew well, reaching 182.34 lakh hectares, an increase of 9.12 lakh hectares. Maize showed the highest growth in this group, adding 9.82 lakh hectares. Pulses too expanded slightly, now covering 109.52 lakh hectares compared to 108.39 lakh hectares last year.

In contrast, oilseeds saw a decrease. With the exception of castor seed, which had a 1.21 lakh hectare gain,

other oilseeds showed lower sowing, and their area shrank to 178.64 lakh acres of land, 6.74 lakh kilometres less than the previous year. Jute and mesta saw a modest decrease to 5.54 lakh hectares, while cotton acreage also decreased by 3.24 lakh hectares to 107.87 lakh hectares.

Sugarcane stood out among cash crops favorably, growing to 57.31 lakh hectares, 1.64 lakh areas greater than the previous year. Since sowing is still going on, the numbers could increase even

INDIA ENSURES SMOOTH FERTILISER SUPPLY FOR KHARIF 2025 DESPITE GLOBAL CHALLENGES



The Central government has assured that there is no shortage of fertilisers during the 2025 kharif season, despite global challenges. According to the Ministry of Chemicals and Fertilisers, the availability of all major fertilisers has remained comfortable. Around 18.3 million meters of urea were available, with 15.5 million meters having already been sold, compared to the 14.3 million meters that were needed. Similarly,

DAP availability was 4.9 million meters against the need of 4.5 million

meters, and NPK availability was 9.7 million meters against the demand of 5.8 million meters.

The government highlighted that urea sales have increased compared to last year due to higher cultivation of paddy and maize, yet supplies remain steady through increased domestic production and

imports. Despite disruptions caused by the Red Sea crisis, the Russia-Ukraine war, and rising global prices, India has secured long-term supply agreements with Morocco and Saudi Arabia to ensure uninterrupted fertiliser availability for farmers.

GOVERNMENT'S ETHANOL PUSH BOOSTS FARMERS' INCOME, CUTS EMISSIONS AND OIL IMPORTS



hrough incentives, advanced biofuel projects, and infrastructural improvements, the government is increasing the production of ethanol. This program has replaced 244 lakh metric tons of crude oil and reduced 736 lakh kilograms of CO₂ emissions since 2014–15. In the Lok Sabha, Union Petroleum Minister Hardeep Singh Puri stated that ethanol blending is increasing farmers' profits and bolstering the rural economy. Under the Alcohol Blended Petrol (EBP) Program, which is supported by the National Policy for Biofuels, farmers have made over ₹1.25 lakh crore, and savings from fewer crude imports have exceeded ₹1.44 lakh crore.

Marketing of Oil in the Public Sector Five months ahead of schedule, in June 2022. companies reached 10% ethanol blending. By July 31, 2025, blending levels had increased to 12.06% in ESY 2022-2023; 14.60% in ESY 2023–2024; and 19.05% in July alone (19.93%). The government has increased feedstock possibilities, lowered GST to 5%, implemented administered pricing, and encouraged distillery renovations in an effort to increase ethanol output.

The Pradhan Mantri JI-VAN Yojana, which was updated in 2024 and cost ₹1,969.50 crore, encourages the production of advanced biofuels from crop leftovers, which reduces stubble burning and generates income for rural areas. With new regulations and a GST reduction, biodiesel blended is also advancing. The goals of these initiatives are environmental sustainability, farmer welfare, and energy security.

Recognizing that over 85% of brain development occurs before age six, NEP 2020 prioritizes foundational literacy and numeracy through structured early childhood education and ECCE programs. This underscores the importance of preparing children for lifelong learning from the very start.

By redefining the traditional 10+2 structure into a 5+3+3+4 format, the policy ensures smoother transitions between stages of schooling while fostering skills alongside academics. Classrooms are now more dynamic—less memorization, more critical thinking, creativity, and hands-on learning become the norm.

NEP 2020 also strengthens local languages and cultural relevance, bolstering comprehension and connection by promoting instruction in students' mother tongue through foundational grades. Technology plays a major role too—platforms and digital tools support learning, enhance teacher effectiveness, and help bridge accessibility gaps.

In essence, NEP 2020 is turning classrooms into vibrant learning ecosystems. Students are encouraged to think, create, and grow—not just succeed in exams. Educators and learners alike are energized by a system that embraces inclusivity, adaptability, and a deeply human vision of education's purpose.

AMAZON INDIA EXPANDS FUTURE ENGINEER SCHOLARSHIP FOR WOMEN

Amazon India has unveiled 500 new technology scholarships for female engineering students from economically disadvantaged backgrounds. This expansion of its Amazon Future Engineer (AFE) initiative coincides with the graduation of the program's first cohort, which achieved over an 80% placement rate in top-tier tech firms, including Amazon itself.

The scholarships target women entering their first year of undergraduate engineering, especially those studying in computer science, IT, or related fields—though all branches are eligible. Each scholar receives financial aid totaling ₹2 lakh over four years (₹50,000 per year), along with a laptop to support their studies.

Beyond monetary support, the program equips students with technical bootcamps, mentorship from Amazon engineers, and access to paid internships at Amazon—creating a strong foundation for academic and professional growth.

Selection is based on academic merit, financial need, and leadership



potential, in collaboration with the nonprofit Foundation for Excellence (FFE). Applications are open from August 18 to November 30, 2025, for the academic cycle spanning 2025–2029.

Since its 2022 launch, AFE has awarded around 1,700 scholarships. Many recipients—often first-generation graduates from smaller towns—have successfully transitioned into careers with Fortune 500 companies, demonstrating the program's transformative impact.

The LMSI launch featured global luminaries from the world of Princeton professor Dr. Manjul will lead the institute's inaugural mathematical community. seminar, focusing on arithmetic statistics and number theory. The intensive four-month programme starts

Vidiyal Payanam combines education with economic empowerment, encouraging selfreliance and confidence among women learners.

Official data highlights the impact of these measures, showing that women now account for 41.4% of Tamil Nadu's workforce in industries, services, and governance. The state has also introduced strong reservation policies to enhance representation, with women holding 30% of positions in education services and 33% in local governance. In some departments, this representation has risen to 50%, reflecting a significant shift toward gender parity in public employment.

By investing in education, providing economic opportunities, and ensuring institutional representation, Tamil Nadu has set a progressive example for women's empowerment in India. These programmes are not only improving the lives of individual women but are also contributing to inclusive growth and social transformation.

here has been a flood of headlines recently claiming that India has ditched the U.S. dollar and ordered BRICS nations to trade only in rupees. The truth is more layered and less dramatic. India is not cutting ties with the dollar, but it is quietly creating more space for the rupee in global trade.

In August 2025, as trade tensions with the United States escalated,

the Reserve Bank of India took a step to make rupee transactions easier. It scrapped the requirement for prior approval when banks open special Rupee Vostro accounts. These accounts allow foreign banks to hold rupees and settle trade directly in India's currency. For businesses, this cuts red tape and lowers costs, while for the government, it signals a long-term goal of strengthening monetary resilience. It is less about fighting the dollar and more about giving India and its partners more flexibility.

This policy move comes against the backdrop of a heated dispute with Washington. Earlier this month, the Trump administration slapped India with a steep 50% tariff on exports, largely over New Delhi's continued oil purchases from Russia. While the U.S. framed the decision as punishment for undermining sanctions, India has made it clear it will not bow to pressure. Still, officials have stressed that the rupee initiative is not an act of retaliation. It is a calculated step to diversify trade options and reduce dependence on a single global currency.

Despite all the buzz about "de-dollarisation," Indian policymakers have been very clear: New Delhi is not abandoning the dollar. Ministry of External Affairs spokespeople and Reserve Bank officials have both said that replacing the dollar is not on India's agenda. Instead, the country is following a practical path—keeping its

agenda. Instead, the country is following a practical path—keeping its doors open to dollar-based trade while promoting the rupee in specific partnerships where it makes sense.

That approach is already visible. India has been settling parts of its

trade in rupees with Russia, the UAE, and the Maldives, among others. Nearly 30 countries now have the option of paying India in rupees through Vostro accounts. For BRICS, which has expanded to include countries such as the UAE, Egypt, and Iran, the idea of moving away from dollar dominance has gained momentum. Local currency trade and even digital payment systems like BRICS Pay are being discussed, but India has taken a cautious line, calling these experiments rather than replacements.

For New Delhi, this balancing act reflects the reality of a multipolar world. India does not want ultimatums—it wants options. Building more space for the rupee does not mean throwing the dollar aside, but it does mean having a stronger toolkit when global risks rise.

At the heart of it, India is nudging its partners toward rupee trade, not forcing them. It is testing a future where its currency has a bigger voice in global markets, without making the mistake of cutting itself off from the dollar, which still dominates international finance. What we are witnessing is not a cold war between currencies, but India's push for flexibility, resilience, and choice in uncertain times.

INDIA PASSES BILL TO BAN MONEY-BASED ONLINE GAMES, APP SHUTDOWNS LOOM



ndia's Parlia ment has passed the Promotion and Regulation of Online and Bill, 2025, a landmark piece of legislation that bans online games

involving real-money stakes. The move marks a dramatic turning point for the country's gaming industry, which had been growing rapidly over the past decade but has faced increasing criticism for fueling addiction, financial ruin, and money laundering.

The bill, cleared by both the Lok Sabha and Rajya Sabha, now awaits the President's assent before becoming law nationwide. It is sweeping in scope. Any game that requires users to place deposits or wagers with the promise of financial gain—whether games of chance like poker and rummy or skill-based formats such as fantasy sports—will be prohibited. Even the advertising of such games will be illegal, with strict penalties attached.

Under the provisions of the bill, operators who continue to offer

money-based games could face up to three years in prison along with fines reaching ₹1 crore. Repeat offenders risk harsher sentences, including a minimum of three years' imprisonment that can extend to five years. The legislation also penalizes advertisers and payment processors tied to such platforms, with possible jail terms of up to two years and fines of ₹50 lakh.

The government's decision comes amid growing concern about the dark side of online gaming. Reports of families falling into debt, students getting hooked on betting-style apps, and illegal money flows through gaming platforms have all contributed to mounting pressure on lawmakers. Officials defending the bill said it was necessary to protect vulnerable groups, especially young people, from the harms of digital gambling disguised as entertainment.

For India's online gaming industry, however, the decision is nothing short of devastating. Companies like Dream11, Mobile Premier League (MPL), WinZO, Games24x7, and RummyCircle—some of which had achieved unicorn status—are now scrambling to survive. Many have already suspended their real-money offerings. Dream11 announced it will pivot entirely to a free-to-play model centered on social gaming, while WinZO and Zupee are shifting focus to casual titles such as Ludo and Carrom that do not involve betting.

The industry's disappointment is underscored by the financial stakes involved. India's online gaming sector had been projected to touch nearly \$3.8 billion by 2029, with significant foreign investment flowing into homegrown platforms. Industry groups warn the new ban could wipe out tens of thousands of jobs, dry up capital inflows, and cause the government

to lose tax revenues estimated at over ₹25,000 crore annually. Investors who had poured billions into the space are now reconsidering their India exposure.

Yet, the government insists the bill is not meant to kill innovation. Alongside the prohibitions, it introduces a framework for responsible and non-monetary gaming. The legislation calls for the establishment of a National Online Gaming Commission, tasked with licensing permissible platforms, ensuring consumer safeguards, and encouraging the growth of esports, educational gaming, and other skill-based formats that do not involve betting. Officials argue this dual approach balances consumer protection with the promotion of a healthier gaming ecosystem.

The passage of the bill has also sparked legal debates, with some experts suggesting that gaming firms may challenge the law in court, especially since earlier Supreme Court judgments had upheld skill-based games like rummy and fantasy sports as legitimate business activities. For now, however, companies are preparing for immediate compliance, shutting down money-based operations, and bracing for a turbulent period of transition.

What happens next will likely reshape India's digital entertainment landscape. By drawing a hard line between gaming and gambling, the government has staked its position firmly on the side of public welfare, even if it comes at the cost of one of the country's fastest-growing industries. The coming months will show whether this gamble pays off—or whether India risks stifling innovation in its bid to protect society.

booking and delivery, ensuring greater efficiency, and creating stronger rural connectivity through an open network system. Today, more than 1.70 lakh offices, including post offices, mail offices, and administrative units, are live on the APT system. To carry this transformation forward, India Post will train over 4.6 lakh employees under a cascade training model that ensures employees adopt the technology smoothly. Officials stated that the new platform will deliver world class services to citizens and enhance financial growth.

24 STARLINK SATELLITES WERE LAUNCHED BY SPACEX ON **AUGUST 14 TO EXPAND INTERNET COVERAGE.**

he active Starlink constellation of SpaceX is designed to provide high-speed data at low cost and to reach even the most rural areas of the world. Currently, the service of SpaceX covers 130 countries, including rural places where traditional broadband is very limited. With the launch on August 14, the active Starlink constellation exceeds 8,100 satellites out of nearly 9,400 launched since 2019, and they plan to launch 12,000 satellites in its first phase, and the number can be increased further. This mission, carried out by a Falcon 9 rocket from Vandenberg Space Force Base, further expands Starlink's active constellation. This launch is the 98th SpaceX Falcon 9 mission in 2025 and the 516th overall Falcon 9 flight since its debut in 2010. Starlink



satellites are flown in such a way that this was the 452nd Falcon 9 first-stage and 427th booster landing, making it cost-effective and reusable. The satellites reach the designated orbit after separation of the upper part of the rocket. The deployment roughly takes one hour after launching. By increasing satellite numbers, Elon Musk aims to dominate the market by providing easy and cost-effective Internet service.

FAIMA LAUNCHES TOLL-FREE HELPLINE NUMBER FOR MENTAL HEALTH OF DOCTORS

he Federation of All India Medical Association (FAIMA) has launched a toll-free Mental Health Redressal Helpline number (MHRH) for doctors, resident healthcare professionals, medical students, and people who are working in the healthcare sector on the 19th of August. This helpline mainly aims to provide free and confidential mental health support and detailed counseling to healthcare professionals, doctors, and medical students who are struggling and suffering from stress, emotional problems, and facing many challenges in their medical careers. This initiative has been taken by FAIMA in response to the rising cases of suicides among doctors and medical students. In July, a young doctor from Mumbai's JJ Hospital attempt suicide because of stress and emotional



Ukadiche Modak Maharashtra's **Divine Sweet**

This Week, We're Relishing Ukadiche Modak – Maharashtra's Divine Sweet Offering

festive delicacy from Maharashtra, Ukadiche Modak is a steamed dumpling filled with sweet coconut-jaggery stuffing and encased in a soft rice flour shell. Prepared especially during Ganesh Chaturthi, it is believed to be Lord Ganesha's favorite sweet. Aromatic, melt-in-mouth, and full of traditional flavors, this treat is both prasadam and comfort food.

Ingredients:

- For Outer Cover (Ukad): Rice flour (2 cups) Water (2 ½ cups) Ghee (1 tsp) Salt (1
- For Filling (Saran): Fresh grated coconut (2 cups) Grated jaggery (1 ½ cups) Ghee (1 tsp)Cardamom powder (½ tsp)Nutmeg powder (a pinch, optional)Chopped cashews & raisins (2 tbsp, optional)

- 1. Make the Filling (Saran): Heat ghee, add coconut and sauté. Mix in jaggery, cook till it blends well. Add cardamom, nutmeg, and dry fruits. Let cool.
- 2. Prepare the Dough (Ukad): Boil water with salt and ghee. Add rice flour gradually, mix well. Cover and steam for 2 minutes. Knead into a soft, smooth dough while warm.
- 3. Shape the Modaks: Grease palms, make small cups from dough. Fill with coconutjaggery mix. Pleat edges and seal to form peak-shaped modaks.
- 4. Steam to Perfection: Place modaks on banana leaf/muslin cloth in steamer. Steam 12–15 minutes until glossy.

Serve warm Ukadiche Modaks drizzled with ghee as naivedya to Lord Ganesha. These soft, aromatic dumplings embody devotion, festivity, and the essence of Maharashtrian tradition. Ukadiche Modak is not just a sweet it's bhakti wrapped in flavor, a symbol of joy that fills every Ganesh Chaturthi with sweetness and grace.
