GURU GOBIND SINGH JAYANTI: THE BIRTH OF COURAGE, FAITH, AND THE KHALSA SPIRIT



As we step into the first week of January 2026, a sense of spiritual preparation begins to settle over many households across the country. On 6th January, 2026, the air will be filled with the sound of hymns as the nation observes Guru Gobind Singh Jayanti. This is not just a simple day; it is a celebration of the birth of the tenth and final human Guru of the Sikhs, who became a champion of justice and equality, and whose life was a testament to the courage and faith.

The story of Guru Gobind Singh Ji began in Patna, Bihar, where he was born as Gobind Rai. He was the only son

of Guru Tegh Bahadur Ji, the ninth Sikh Guru, and Mata Gujri Ji. Even as a young child, it was clear that he possessed an exceptional spirit. He grew up during a time of challenges, witnessing the difficulties people faced when trying to practice their faith freely. His early years were a blend of spiritual learning, learning multiple languages, and training in martial arts.

A turning point in his life, and a significant moment in history, came when he was only nine years old. His father, Guru Tegh Bahadur Ji, sacrificed his life to protect the religious freedom of others. Following this loss, young Gobind Rai was formally

considered as the tenth Sikh Guru, and he embraced it with a wisdom and determination that was far beyond his age. He realized that his community needed guidance and strength to deal with the challenging times ahead.

Throughout his life, Guru Gobind Singh Ji made contributions that changed the world around him. He wasn't just a spiritual leader; he was a poet, a philosopher, and a warrior who taught his followers to live with honesty and compassion. For example, the Kirpan represents the dignity and the need to defend the innocent, while the Kara serves as a constant reminder of one's connection to the divine.

Before he passed away, Guru Gobind Singh Ji made a decision defining the future of the faith. He declared that there would be no more human Gurus after him. Instead, he named the holy scripture, the Guru Granth Sahib as the eternal Guru. This book contains the hymns and teachings of the Gurus and other saints, offering a source of wisdom for everyone. By doing this, he ensured that the core values of equality and faith would remain pure and accessible to everyone.

Today, the way we celebrate Guru Gobind Singh Jayanti reflects the significance of his teachings. Gurdwaras become centers of community life, filled with the singing of Kirtan. One can observe processions called Nagar Kirtans moving through the streets, where people sing and display martial arts. It's a celebration of faith that brings people together in a joyful way. These events are not just for the Sikh community; they are open to everyone, reflecting the Guru Gobind Singh's belief that all people are equal.

One of the most significant parts of the celebration is the Langar, or the free community kitchen. GANGADHAR TILAK KATNAM: THE MAN WHO HEALS ROADS



In the middle of Hyderabad's chaotic traffic, where most people are rushing to get to work or complaining about the state of the roads, you might spot an elderly man leaning over to fix a big hole in the road. This is Gangadhar Tilak Katnam. At an age of 77 years, while most people of his age prefer retirement with rest, he is found on the streets, often under a scorching sun, filling potholes with his hands. He is not a government employee, nor he is being paid. In fact, he uses his own pension money to do it. He has become a local legend, a man who decided that instead of waiting for the world to change, he would simply pick up a shovel and start the change himself.

The story of how he became the "Pothole Man" is truly inspiring. After a long career as an employee with the Indian Railways, Mr. Gangadhar

Tilak Katnam took a job at a software company. But his daily commute became a source of sadness. He witnessed a tragic accident where a young person lost their life because of a massive crater in the road, and he saw countless others swerving and crashing. It shook him to his core. He realized that while the government was slow to act, people were suffering every single day. He could not just drive past those holes considering them death traps.

He started with small efforts. He began carrying gunny bags of gravel and stone dust in the back of his old car. Whenever he saw a pothole, he would get out and fill it. In the beginning, people thought he was strange. Some mocked him, and others assumed he was a laborer who had lost his way. It's hard for many to understand why a retired professional would spend his time doing backbreaking manual labor in the dirt. Initially, even his own

family was worried about his health, and the fact that he was spending his savings on roads. But he was strongly determined, and told his wife that if he could prevent even one accident his life and his money were well spent.

Mr. Gangadhar Tilak Katnam eventually quit his job because it was taking up too much time that he felt should be spent on the roads. He started an initiative called "Shramadaan," which is all about the "donation of labor." His philosophy is, we all use the roads, so we all have a responsibility to look after them. He doesn't blame protests or the system. Instead, he believes in civic sweat. He feels that if every citizen took care of the smapatch of road in front of their house or office, the country would be transformed.

There is something very beautiful about the way he works. He treats the road almost like a

doctor treats a patient. He carefully clears the mud, layers the stones, and packs it until the surface is smooth again. He calls it "healing the road". Over the years, he has fixed thousands of potholes. What started as a secluded mission has turned into a small movement. Students and young professionals inspired by his selfless spirit, sometimes join him. They see this elderly man working tirelessly and feel a sense of shame for their own indifference. He has become a grandfather figure for the whole city, showing everyone that you are never too old to serve your community.

His relationship with the local government has also changed over time. Initially, they ignored him or were embarrassed by his work, but as his story disseminated, they began to respect him. Sometimes they even provide the materials he needs. He has shown that one person's persistence can eventually force a system to move. He is not interested in awards or fame and just wants to make sure a mother gets home to her children safely or a student does not fall off their bike on the way to school.

Writing about Mr. Gangadhar Tilak Katnam reminds us that the most powerful tool for change is not a social media post, it's a pair of willing hands. He reminds us that we have more power than we think. We don't have to wait for permission to be kind or to make things better.

As you walk or drive through your own neighborhood today, think of Mr. Gangadhar Tilak Katnam. Think of the man who decided that his retirement would be spent in the dust, making life a little smoother, making the world a little better. His story is a challenge to all of us to stop looking away from the potholes and to start doing the small work of fixing them. He is a proof that a single individual, driven by true spirit, and empathy can truly pave the way for a better world.

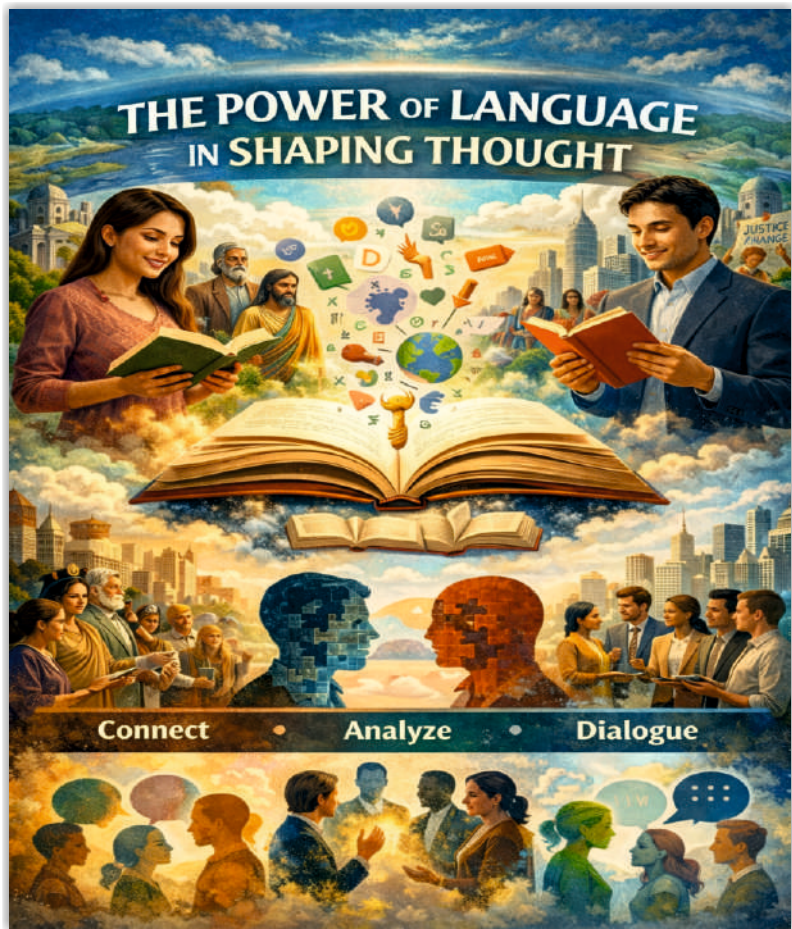

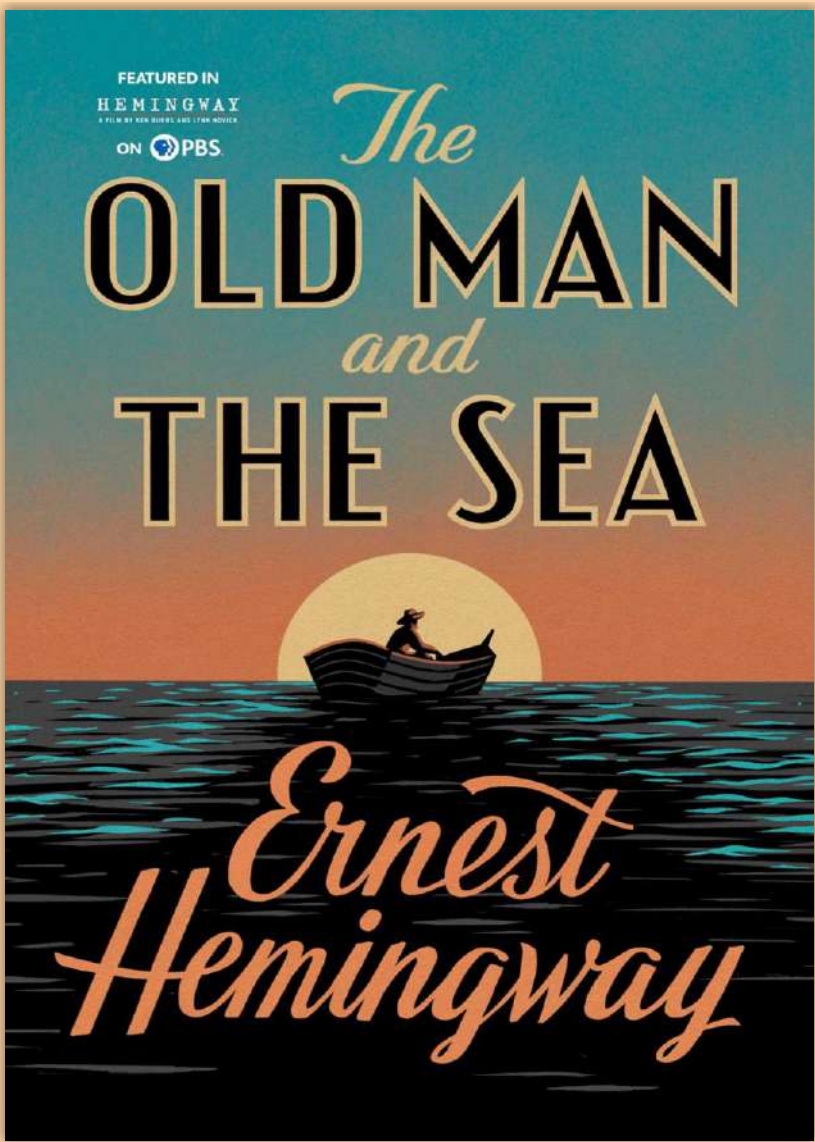
Rudyard Kipling was an English journalist, poet, and short-story writer best known for The Jungle Book, Kim, and his inspirational poetry.

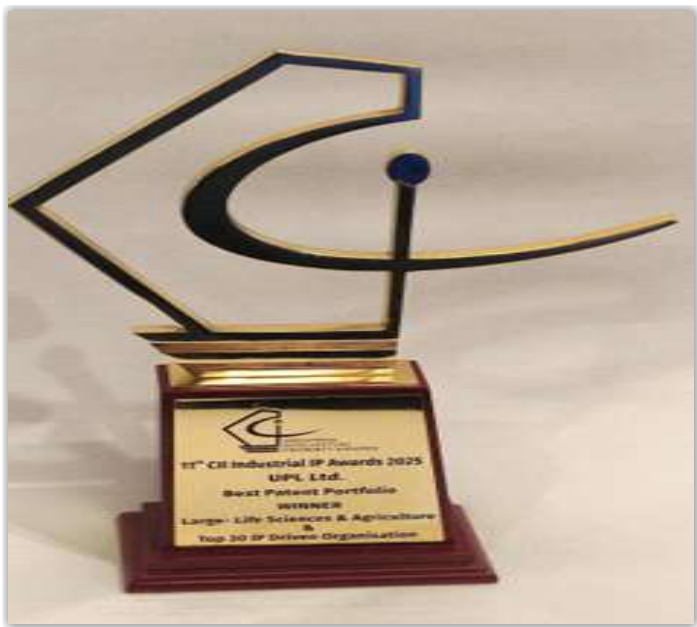

NEW FERTILIZER EQUIPMENT OFFERS PRECISION AND DUAL-APPLICATION CAPABILITIES



Agricultural machinery manufacturers are unveiling a new generation of fertilizer equipment that delivers both higher precision and dual-product capabilities, helping farmers improve nutrient management and field efficiency. Modern systems integrate advanced GPS-based controls that automatically adjust application rates in real time according to pre-set field prescriptions, reducing waste and ensuring nutrients are applied exactly where and when crops need them. These controls are increasingly standard across top models in the market.

A major trend is the rise of dual-product application machinery, which allows operators to simultaneously

spread two different fertilizers or combine fertilizer with lime in a single pass. This capability cuts down the number of field trips required, saving time and fuel while maintaining accurate placement. Wider spread widths—up to 120 feet on some models mean more ground is covered faster, particularly beneficial for large farms.

Innovations also extend to hybrid systems such as enhanced anhydrous ammonia applicators that merge tillage and nutrient delivery in one operation, significantly streamlining fieldwork. Apart from performance, many manufacturers are focusing on rugged design features like sealed hubs and corrosion-resistant components to lower maintenance needs.

Prices reflect these high-tech integrations with ranges from basic units around \$60,000 to advanced, multi-row precision planters that may exceed \$400,000 a reflection of both cutting-edge capability and the growing demand for efficient, data-driven fertilizer application.

PUNJAB'S AGRICULTURAL REVOLUTION ACCELERATES, SAYS CHIEF MINISTER

Punjab's Chief Minister Maryam Nawaz Sharif has declared that an agricultural revolution is underway in the province, driven by a series of ambitious reforms and support programmes aimed at empowering farmers and modernising the farming sector. According to official statements, the government's initiatives are reshaping traditional agricultural practices and reducing farmers' reliance on exploitative middlemen.



Central to this transformation is the Kissan Card scheme, which has already been issued to more than 800,000 farmers, marking a historic milestone in Pakistan's agricultural history. The digital card allows farmers to directly purchase critical inputs such as fertiliser, certified seeds, and pesticides from registered dealers, bypassing intermediaries and ensuring fairer prices. It also provides access to Rs 250 billion in interest-free agricultural loans, helping farmers avoid high-interest debt and improve financial stability.

Officials report that nearly 20 per cent of Kissan Card holders have utilised the facility to buy diesel for their

machinery, further reducing debt burdens and supporting year-round farming operations. These measures aim to boost productivity and enhance the economic welfare of rural communities across Punjab.

Chief Minister Maryam Nawaz highlighted the importance of agriculture to the national economy, emphasising the government's commitment to ensuring farmers have the resources they need to thrive. She stated that all available resources are being mobilised to take agricultural development to its highest potential, reflecting a long-term vision for a prosperous and self-reliant farming sector in the region.

NEW LAW TO CRACK DOWN ON SPURIOUS SEEDS AND PESTICIDES WITH CRIMINAL PENALTIES



The Indian government is preparing a stringent new law to combat the widespread sale of spurious and substandard seeds and pesticides, Union Agriculture Minister Shivraj Singh Chouhan announced at a farmer outreach event in Maharashtra. Under this proposed legislation, companies and individuals found responsible for producing or distributing fake agricultural inputs could face penal and criminal action, including compensation obligations if crop failures arise due to their products.

Currently, farmers often suffer significant losses when inputs fail to perform as expected, but enforcement under existing laws has been fragmented. The new Seed and

Pesticide Law aims to make regulatory action more effective by holding manufacturers and sellers legally liable for poor-quality seeds and pesticides, thereby strengthening accountability across the sector.

In his address, Chouhan also emphasised the need to modernise agricultural education and introduce a credible certification system for organic farming — a move expected to support higher market value for residue-free produce. Additionally, the government released funds under the Rashtriya Krishi Vikas Yojana to bolster agriculture in the state and warned of strict action against artificial shortages and black-marketing of farm inputs.

By combining tougher legal measures with support for quality inputs and producer protection, the government aims to safeguard farmers' interests and improve the overall reliability of agricultural supplies in India.

STRATEGIC ACTION PLAN TO UNLOCK BIHAR'S TURMERIC POTENTIAL



A recent agri-business strategy review highlights how a focused action plan could help Bihar harness the full potential of turmeric cultivation, boosting farmer incomes and strengthening the state's agricultural economy. While the full article from The Hindu BusinessLine wasn't accessible, the broader context of Bihar's crop diversification and spice cultivation efforts reflects this thrust. Bihar has been encouraging spice crops such as turmeric, ginger, and other high-value products under government-backed schemes to improve rural livelihoods and add value to traditional farming systems.

Turmeric a spice with growing domestic and international demand due to its culinary use and health-oriented market presents an opportunity for farmers in parts of Bihar suited to its cultivation. By integrating cultivation with value chain development, processing, and market linkages, the state could help farmers capture better prices, reduce post-harvest losses, and access premium markets. This includes extension support, quality seed distribution, agronomic training, and infrastructure for processing spice products.

Earlier efforts to promote spice and alternate crop cultivation in Bihar align with the action plan's goals, including incentives for farmers and technical support for diversified agriculture. These broader policies suggest that targeted interventions, when combined with market orientation and value addition, can help transform turmeric from a traditional crop into a commercially viable agricultural enterprise in the state, benefitting producers and strengthening the rural economy.

NCERT POISED TO BECOME DEEMED UNIVERSITY
BY JANUARY-END



The National Council of Educational Research and Training (NCERT) is likely to be granted deemed-to-be-university status by the end of January 2026, nearly two years after the proposal was first announced by Union Education Minister Dharmendra Pradhan. According to education ministry officials, all preparatory work has been completed and the final decision is expected within the next 15 to 20 days, following a crucial meeting with the University Grants Commission (UGC).

The proposed status will be conferred under the 'de-novo' category, a special provision meant for institutions that focus on teaching and research in unique and emerging areas

of knowledge. Under UGC guidelines, de-novo institutions are selected after a rigorous review process to ensure academic innovation and national relevance. NCERT, which is best known for developing school textbooks and curriculum frameworks, is expected to take on a much larger role once it becomes a deemed university. It will be able to launch academic programmes, deepen research activity, and collaborate with global institutions.

Education Minister Pradhan has said that this transition will support India's shift from degree-centric education to a skills-based learning ecosystem, as envisioned in the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020. The move is also expected to strengthen teacher education and pedagogy research. If cleared, NCERT's new status will mark a turning point, positioning it as a national and global hub for educational innovation and research.

SRINAGAR TO GET FIRST STATE-OF-THE-ART SCHOOL
FOR SPECIALLY-ABLED CHILDREN

Deputy Commissioner of Srinagar, Akshay Labroo, announced the establishment of the Abhinandan School, the first state-of-the-art institution in the Kashmir division dedicated to children with special needs. This school aims to provide specialized education for students with visual and hearing impairments and represents a significant advancement in the region's infrastructure for inclusive education

The upcoming institution will be equipped with modern infrastructure, specialised classrooms, therapy rooms, assistive technologies, and barrier-free access, ensuring a supportive learning environment for children with diverse physical and cognitive challenges. Officials said the school will follow an integrated model combining academics, therapy, skill development, and life-skills training.

The facility is designed to cater to children with hearing, visual, locomotor, intellectual, and learning disabilities, offering tailored teaching methodologies and individualised

education plans. Trained special educators, therapists, and counsellors will form part of the multidisciplinary team.

District authorities highlighted that the initiative addresses a long-standing gap in the region, where families previously had limited access to specialised educational institutions. The school will also function as a resource centre, providing guidance, parental counselling, and community outreach programmes to raise awareness about inclusive education.

By creating this dedicated space for specially-abled learners, Srinagar takes a decisive step toward educational equity and social inclusion. The project reflects the administration's commitment to ensuring that every child, regardless of ability, has the opportunity to learn, grow, and thrive in a safe and empowering environment.

IIT HYDERABAD LAUNCHES CENTRE FOR CREATIVE
ARTS TO BLEND ART WITH TECHNOLOGY

The Indian Institute of Technology (IIT) Hyderabad has launched a new Centre for Creative Arts (CCA) to formally integrate creativity, liberal arts, and artistic practices into technical education. Established within the Department of Liberal Arts, the centre aims to bridge engineering and science with the expressive power of the arts.



Creative and liberal arts have been part of IIT Hyderabad's academic framework for more than a decade. The initiative began in 2014 with heritage walks for first-year students and gradually expanded into credited courses. Today, nearly 10 per cent of the undergraduate curriculum includes creative and liberal arts components such as photography, fine arts, crafts, and performing arts.

The CCA will now offer one to three credit courses for undergraduate and postgraduate students and appoint performing artists as adjunct faculty and distinguished professors. Plans also include Artist-in-Residence programmes, encouraging sustained

interaction between students and professional artists. Visiting practitioners may co-supervise doctoral research, linking practice-based knowledge with academic inquiry.

The Centre will promote doctoral studies in the arts and collaborate with cultural organisations such as SPIC MACAY to strengthen campus cultural life.

Beyond IIT Hyderabad, the Centre will conduct outreach programmes for school students and art teachers, nurturing early exposure to creative disciplines and reinforcing the institute's engagement with the wider community.

PUNJAB GOVERNOR CALLS FOR STRONG PUSH TO
GIRLS' EDUCATION IN BORDER COLLEGES

Punjab Governor Gulab Chand Kataria has urged higher education institutions in the state's border districts to place special emphasis on girls' education, academic mentoring, and faculty development, stressing the need to bridge learning gaps in geographically sensitive regions.

Addressing educators and administrators, the Governor noted that colleges located near the international border face unique challenges, including limited infrastructure, shortage of experienced faculty, and lower enrolment of female students. He said focused academic support and institutional backing are essential to ensure that students in these areas receive opportunities equal to their urban counterparts.

Kataria highlighted the importance of digital learning tools and technology-enabled classrooms to overcome physical and resource constraints. He encouraged colleges to adopt online platforms, virtual laboratories, and blended learning models so that students can access high-quality

academic resources irrespective of location.

Underscoring the social impact of educating girls, the Governor said that higher participation of women in higher education strengthens families, communities, and the nation as a whole. He also advocated for structured mentoring systems, career counselling, and leadership programmes to build confidence among young women in border districts.

By calling for a renewed focus on academic support, digital learning, and inclusive policies, Kataria reaffirmed the government's commitment to building an equitable and regionally balanced higher education system, ensuring that talent from border areas is nurtured and empowered to contribute meaningfully to Punjab's growth.

IGNOU'S NEW REGIONAL &

IN TRIBAL ODISHA



President Droupadi Murmu inaugurated a new Indira Gandhi National Open University (IGNOU) regional and skill center in Rairangpur, Mayurbhanj district, Odisha, aimed at improving access to higher education, skill development, and livelihood opportunities in a predominantly tribal area. The center will offer programs in agriculture, food processing, tourism, hospitality, retail, IT and IT-enabled services, and entrepreneurship, promoting sustainable career paths and supporting local business expansion.

The center is positioned as a key hub for northern Odisha, focused on enhancing employability through skill-based education and training support. The inauguration event was attended by prominent figures including Jayant Chaudhary, Minister of State for Skill Development and Entrepreneurship, and Dharmendra Pradhan, Union Minister of Education.

POWER SHIFT IN THE GLOBAL EV RACE AS CHINESE AUTOMAKERS OVERTAKE A SLOWING AMERICAN PIONEER



The global electric vehicle landscape is undergoing a dramatic realignment, with a leading Chinese manufacturer emerging as the world's largest seller of electric vehicles and signaling a broader shift in industrial power, technology maturity, and consumer trust. Over the past year, the Chinese firm strengthened its momentum in both production and delivery volumes, while its long-time American rival recorded its first meaningful decline in annual sales and manufacturing output, reflecting a challenging mix of competitive pressure, policy changes, and brand-related headwinds.

Industry data show that the American company delivered just over 1.6 million vehicles in 2025, marking a year-on-year fall in both production and sales. The downturn comes after years of market dominance, when the brand virtually defined the modern EV era. Its production levels also slipped, pointing to operational strains at a time when competitors particularly from China and South Korea are rapidly scaling up capacity, refining technology, and offering a wider choice of

models across price segments. For a business long viewed as the pace-setter of the industry, the slowdown signals a new phase in which innovation leadership no longer guarantees commercial supremacy.

In contrast, the Chinese automaker ended the year with strong growth across its electric vehicle portfolio, crossing more than two million fully electric deliveries and benefiting from a broader product pipeline, cost-efficient supply chains, and a vast domestic market that increasingly drives global EV economics. The company's performance reflects the rise of China's new-energy ecosystem one powered by deep-rooted manufacturing networks, integrated battery production, a dense vendor base, and sustained investment in research and development. Analysts note that this industrial depth enables Chinese manufacturers to scale faster, manage costs more effectively, and respond flexibly to market conditions.

Another factor reinforcing China's advantage is the strength of its home market, which continues to serve as a testing ground for new models, software systems, and production efficiencies. The country's supportive policy environment, wide charging infrastructure, and consumer acceptance of EVs have created an environment where innovation translates swiftly into volume growth. Even global brands, including the American automaker, rely heavily on Chinese manufacturing hubs to meet delivery commitments underlining how strategic the region has become to the global EV supply map.

The American manufacturer, meanwhile, faced a confluence of

external and internal pressures through the year. The expiry of federal tax credits in the United States reduced price competitiveness just as global rivals intensified discount-led competition. Political controversies around corporate leadership also fed uncertainty, triggering customer resentment and workforce unease in some markets. Despite these challenges, investor confidence has not entirely evaporated, with markets still betting on the company's long-term bets on autonomous mobility, robotics, and next-generation EV platforms. At the same time, the company has begun rolling out more affordable vehicle variants to reclaim ground in price-sensitive regions, particularly Europe and Asia, where Chinese brands have gained share rapidly. Supporters argue that the transition phase may eventually strengthen its strategic focus, though regulatory scrutiny and product-safety debates continue to shape public perception especially in key U.S. markets where licensing and compliance issues have surfaced.

The changing leaderboard in the global EV sector is more than a corporate rivalry story it reflects a deeper transformation in industrial capability and economic geography. The rise of Chinese manufacturers underscores how strong domestic ecosystems, scale-driven efficiency, and policy-aligned investment can reshape global competition in emerging technologies. For the American pioneer, the coming years may represent a test of resilience, adaptability, and the ability to reinvent value propositions in a market no longer defined by a single dominant player.

DEBATE DEEPENS OVER INDIA'S GIG ECONOMY AS PLATFORMS DEFEND FLEXIBILITY AND WORKERS SEEK FAIRER PROTECTIONS

India's rapidly expanding gig and quick-commerce sector has once again moved to the centre of public discussion, as contrasting perspectives emerge on how delivery-based work is shaping livelihoods, earnings, and labour security. On one side, platform operators highlight rising incomes, flexible working hours, and welfare initiatives that they say make gig work a viable earning opportunity for millions. On the other, worker collectives argue that the ground reality remains far more demanding, with inconsistent payouts, limited safety nets, and the absence of social-security protections that are normally associated with formal employment.

According to figures shared by one major food-delivery and quick-commerce platform, delivery partners have seen improvement in average hourly earnings over the past year, with performance-linked payouts, customer tips, and region-specific incentives contributing to income growth. The company pointed out that gig roles are designed to be flexible rather than full-time employment tracks, allowing individuals to log in for selected hours, work closer to home, and balance income generation with studies, caregiving, or other occupations. Many partners, it said, work intermittently through the year, reinforcing the claim that the model is built around autonomy rather than compulsion.

The platform also emphasised that faster delivery commitments are enabled largely by hyper-local networks and shorter distances, rather than time pressure on riders. It stressed that the operating system does not display countdown timers to partners and that safety remains a shared responsibility. Alongside earnings, the company highlighted welfare initiatives such as accident and medical insurance, emergency assistance, financial-literacy support, and access to voluntary pension schemes measures that, in its view, reflect a maturing ecosystem gradually moving

toward greater social protection.

However, worker groups representing delivery partners present a sharply different narrative. They argue that once fuel, vehicle maintenance, and other incidental costs are deducted, actual take-home earnings are significantly lower than headline figures. For those who depend on gig work as their primary source of income, the absence of paid leave, fixed wages, or statutory benefits can create uncertainty and financial stress, especially during lean-order periods or health emergencies. Some groups also point out that only a small share of orders attract tips, meaning that the supplementary income showcased by platforms may not be uniform across riders or cities.

Unions and worker-rights advocates further contend that frequent changes in incentive structures, long working hours for full-time earners, and the risks associated with road-based work demand clearer standards and stronger safeguards. They are calling for greater transparency in earnings data, formal recognition of platform workers within labour frameworks, and minimum protection thresholds that ensure dignity and stability without undermining the flexibility that many riders value.

Supporters of the current model maintain that gig work has opened millions of livelihood opportunities that did not exist a decade ago, especially for first-generation earners, migrants, and youth seeking quick entry into the workforce. Critics respond that growth alone is not enough unless it translates into secure, sustainable, and humane working



conditions.

The conversation unfolding around the sector reflects a broader transition in India's labour landscape one where technology-enabled platforms, evolving employment preferences, and expectations of social protection must find a workable balance. As participation in gig work continues to rise, the path ahead will likely depend on collaborative solutions that protect workers' welfare while preserving the flexibility and opportunity that drew many to the ecosystem in the first place.

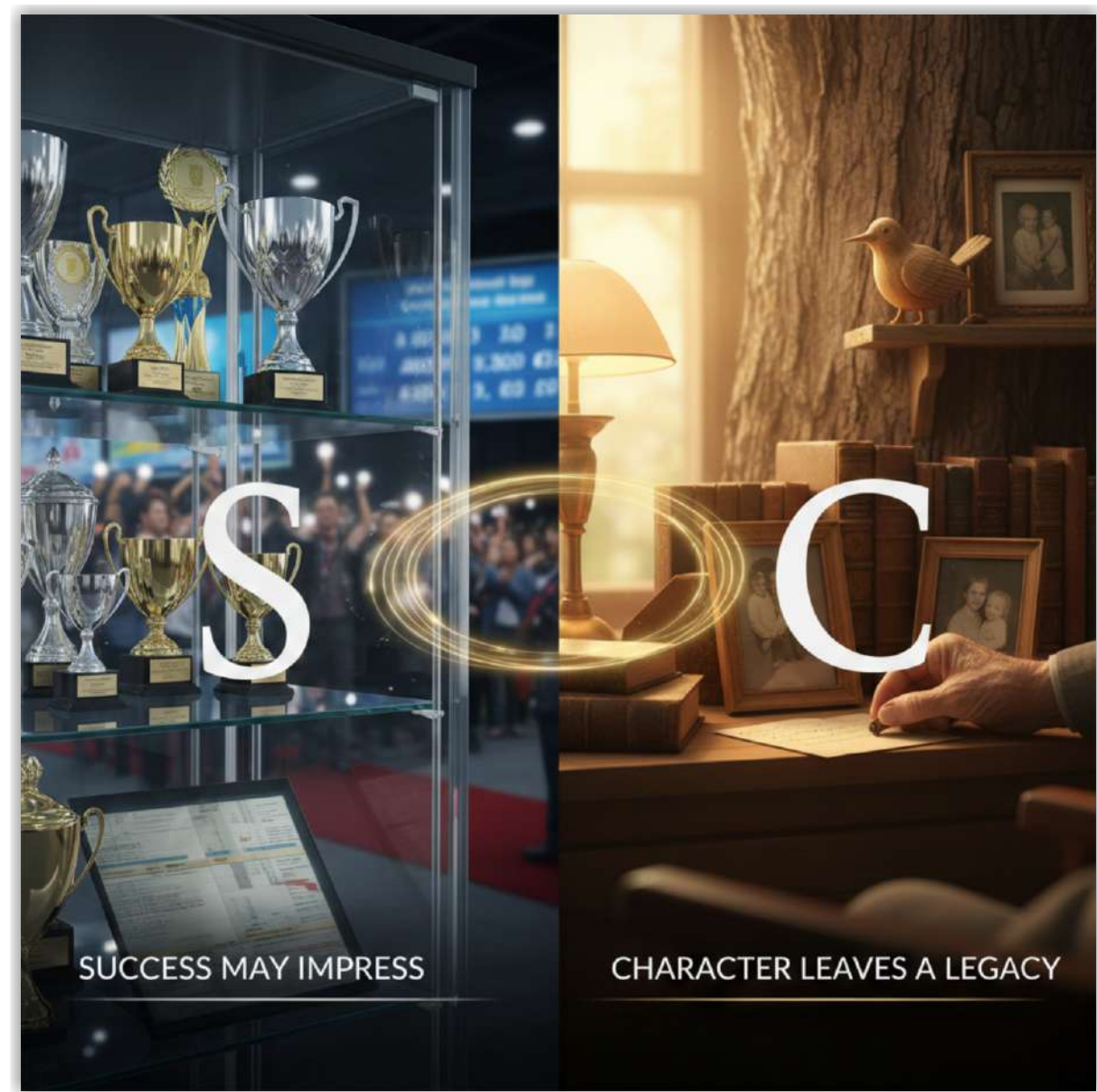

INDUS WATERS TREATY ON HOLD AS INDIA PUSHES AHEAD
WITH NEW HYDEL PROJECT ON CHENAB



India has decided to move forward with a new hydroelectric power project on the Chenab River, even though the Indus Waters Treaty (IWT) with Pakistan is currently not working smoothly due to ongoing political and security tensions between the two countries. Senior government officials said that India has started the process to build another run-of-the-river hydropower project in Jammu and Kashmir. With this step, India wants to fully use its share of river waters under the Indus river system. Although the Chenab River is mainly meant for Pakistan under the treaty, India is allowed to build hydroelectric projects on it as long as they do not store or block water. This decision comes a few months after India officially informed Pakistan that it wants to review and change parts of the Indus Waters Treaty. India says this is needed because Pakistan has often raised objections to Indian hydropower projects, which has caused delays. India also believes that the situation today is very different from what it was when the treaty was signed in 1960. The Indus Waters Treaty has been one of the most important agreements between India and Pakistan, even during difficult times. However, recent developments show that India is now taking a stronger stand to protect its interests while still staying within the rules of the treaty.

AVATAR: FIRE AND ASH EARNINGS SURGE DESPITE
DHURANDHAR FEVER, EYES RS 150 CRORE
AT INDIAN BOX OFFICE

James Cameron's Avatar series has a strong fan following in India, and this is clearly seen in its box office performance. Even though Ranveer Singh's Dhurandhar has dominated cinemas and pushed aside many recent releases, Avatar: Fire and Ash is still doing well and earning steady collections even after 10–11 days of release. The film has become the highest-grossing Hollywood movie of 2025 in India, beating Mission: Impossible – The Final Reckoning. This is impressive because the movie was released on limited screens, received mixed reviews, and faced tough competition from big Indian films. Avatar: Fire and Ash opened in India on December 19 with a collection of ₹19 crore. Its earnings increased over the weekend, collecting ₹22.5 crore on Saturday and ₹25.75 crore on Sunday. By the end of its first week, the film had crossed ₹100 crore at the Indian box office. The movie continued to perform steadily in its second week. So far, it has earned ₹137.81 crore in India and is expected to reach ₹150 crore soon. Globally, the film has collected around \$760.4 million. The movie stars Sam Worthington, Zoe Saldana, Kate Winslet, and others. James Cameron has confirmed that more Avatar films are coming, including Avatar 4 and Avatar 5.



AFTER PINAKA, DRDO CONDUCTS LAUNCH
OF TWO PRALAY MISSILES



India's Defence Research and Development Organisation (DRDO) successfully tested two Pralay missiles on Wednesday. Both missiles were fired one after the other from the same launcher in a salvo launch. This important test took place a day after the successful first flight of the Pinaka Long Range Guided Rocket. According to the Ministry of Defence, both Pralay missiles followed their planned paths and met all test goals. The launch was conducted around 10.30 am off the coast of Odisha as part of user trials. Sensors at the Integrated Test Range in Chandipur tracked the missiles and confirmed their performance. Pralay is an indigenously developed missile that uses solid fuel and modern guidance systems to hit targets with high accuracy. It can carry different types of warheads and strike various targets. The missile was developed by DRDO's Research Centre Imarat in Hyderabad, with support from several other DRDO laboratories. Defence Minister Rajnath Singh said the test proved the reliability of the Pralay missile system. DRDO Chairman Dr Samir V. Kamat said the missile is now close to being inducted into the armed forces. Earlier, DRDO also successfully tested the Pinaka Long Range Guided Rocket with a range of 120 km. The rocket hit its target accurately and can be fired from the existing Pinaka launcher. The Indian Army plans to expand its Pinaka regiments by 2026.

INDIA'S TOXIC AIR: A SILENT ECONOMIC TAX

The air pollution problem in India has become a significant drain on the economy, which the public does not directly experience and is not just related to health. The high levels of the Air Quality Index (AQI) have been like a stealthy tax on families, companies, and the nation's economy. Increased pollution-related illnesses such as asthma, heart disease, and lung infections are forcing people to spend more on doctor consultations, air purifiers, masks, and medicines. The productivity of the workforce takes a hit because of poor air quality that always leads to high absenteeism, tired workers, and lower efficiency. The outdoor industries such as construction, transportation, and street vendors suffer from severe pollution cases that lead to workers stopping working for long periods. Increased absenteeism at schools is a result of this while exposure over a longer period is denying children their cognitive and physical development, which will lead to economic losses in the future. The impact of air pollution on tourism and city commerce is that the polluted cities lose their attractiveness to visitors and thus are not visited by tourists. Pollution is viewed as a silent economic tax and if it is not dealt with immediately, India will continue to suffer from slow growth. Fighting toxics in the air is both an environmental must and an economic necessity for sustainability.



INDIA BANS HIGH-DOSE NIMESULIDE FORMULATIONS OVER
SERIOUS HEALTH RISKS



Nimesulide high-dose formulations which is a non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drug (NSAID) have been banned, warning of serious health risks related to its use. Nimesulide is widely used in the treatment of pain and inflammation, however, studies have associated the higher amounts with liver damage, gastrointestinal bleeding, and other dangerous reactions which made regulators take action for public safety. Health professionals said that misuse and overuse of high-strength formulations were the main causes of adverse reactions, particularly among people with chronic illnesses and those on multiple drugs. The government policy aimed at restricting narcotic use is just another step toward a considerable reduction in drug-related liver injuries and other complications that are reported in hospitals and clinics across the country. From now on, doctors and pharmacists will have to either change the patient's medication to a safer one or give nimesulide only at lower dosages as approved by the health authorities. The medical professionals have given a nod to the authorities saying it will be beneficial in preventing health risks that are otherwise unavoidable and at the same time will promote the prudent use of analgesics. This ban demonstrates India's continuous dedication to patient safety and the logical use of drugs. Furthermore, it sends a strong signal regarding the necessity for health providers to weigh and measure the benefits versus harms of the medication treatments.

INDIA TO OPEN FOUR SEMICONDUCTOR PLANTS FOR
COMMERCIAL PRODUCTION IN 2026

India's semiconductor manufacturing capabilities will soon be powered by four new semiconductor fabrication plants that are to commence commercial production in 2026. This event is a major breakthrough in the country's campaign to cut down on imports of electronic components and to secure a larger share of the electronics supply chain globally. The factories symbolize India's greater development plans to be the center of semiconductor fabrication and cutting-edge electronics manufacturing. The government incentives and investment promotions have therefore made the semiconductor sector forecasted to be a job creator, a means of transfer of technology, and an economic growth stimulator. These manufacturing sites will be mainly producing chips that are simply needed in various electronic items, mobile phones, car electronic systems, and other high-tech applications. In this way, the Indian market will be supplied with the required amount of chips, and at the same time, the country will be open to selling some of them abroad. The rising global semiconductor demand is a good reason for the upcoming production from the semiconductor plants in India to be strategically guided and low in risk. Plus, this step contributes to the country's government initiatives aimed at developing innovation and self-sufficiency in important strategic sectors.

AT BADMINTON NATIONALS



The 2025 Senior National Badminton Championships in Vijayawada became very special, especially in women's singles. Indian star PV Sindhu closely followed the final and shared her excitement on social media. She supported Surya Charishma Tamiri, also called “Cherry,” while praising 14-year-old Tanvi Patri for her fighting spirit. Sindhu said it was wonderful to see both young players push each other on such a big stage. In the final, 19-year-old Surya Charishma defeated Tanvi Patri in a thrilling three-game match, winning 17-21, 21-12, 21-14. Tanvi, who was hoping to become the youngest national champion, impressed everyone with her performance and earned special praise from Sindhu, who called her a future star of Indian

badminton. Surya changed the match in the second game by winning seven points in a row. In the deciding game, she played long rallies, and Tanvi began to tire. Surya finished strongly by winning the last six points to take the title. In men's singles, Rithvik Sanjeevi S won the championship by beating Bharat Raghav 21-16, 22-20. He showed great calm and strong defence throughout the tournament. In women's doubles, Shikha Gautam and Ashwini Bhat K won the title. The men's doubles crown went to Hariharan Amsakarunan and R Ruban Kumar. In mixed doubles, Sathwik Reddy K and Radhika Sharma emerged champions.

FIDE WORLD RAPID CHAMPIONSHIPS: KONERU HUMPY
SETTLES FOR BRONZE; ARJUN ERIGAISI FINISHES THIRD

Indian chess star Koneru Humpy faced a heartbreaking finish at the FIDE World Rapid Championships, settling for a bronze medal in the women's section. Humpy, who won the world rapid title in 2019 and 2024, came very close to winning her third title. After the final round, she was tied at the top with China's Zhu Jiner and Russia's Aleksandra Goryachkina, with all three scoring 8.5 points. However, the final rankings were decided by tie-break rules set by FIDE. Based on these calculations, Humpy finished third, while Zhu and Goryachkina took the top two spots. Goryachkina later defeated Zhu in the tie-break match to win her first world rapid title and a prize of 40,000 euros. In the last round, Humpy drew her game against young Indian player B. Savitha Shri. If Humpy had won that match, she would have finished with nine points and created history by becoming the first woman to win three world rapid titles. Savitha finished fourth with eight points, while R. Vaishali placed fifth. Divya Deshmukh finished eighth, and D. Harika ended in 19th place. In the Open category, world number one Magnus Carlsen won his sixth World Rapid title. India's Arjun Erigaisi won the bronze medal, making it a proud moment for Indian chess.



WOMEN'S HOCKEY INDIA LEAGUE: GORZELANY SHINING
BUT INDISCIPLINE COSTING TIGERS VERSUS SG PIPERS

In a very thrilling match of the Women's Hockey India League, the star player of the Tigers was Agustina Gorzelany who again displayed her talent with very strong techniques, tactical understanding, and a highly energetic style of playing. Her contributions not only kept the Tigers in the match but also were very attractive to the spectators showing their intention to attack and control the ball. Nevertheless, the Tigers were not able to get a win with full points despite Gorzelany's exceptional performance, mostly because of the discipline problems on the field. SHAFALI VERMA BREAKS RECORD OF SCORING MOST RUNS
IN A T20I SERIES FOR INDIA

Shafali Verma is in great form right now. The 21-year-old cricketer from Rohtak, Haryana, is opening the batting for the Indian women's cricket team in the ongoing five-match T20I series against Sri Lanka. In the four matches played so far, she has scored a total of 236 runs. Shafali began the series in Visakhapatnam on December 21 with a quick 9 runs from just 5 balls. After that, she played three brilliant innings. She scored an unbeaten 69 off 34 balls, followed by an unbeaten 79 off 42 balls, and then another strong 79 from 46 balls in the fourth match. Her performance in the fourth T20I, played at the Greenfield International Stadium in Thiruvananthapuram on December 28, helped her reach this record total. With 236 runs, Shafali has now set a new Indian record for the most runs scored by an Indian batter in a women's T20I series. Earlier, this record belonged to Smriti Mandhana, who scored 221 runs in a five-match T20I series against England in mid-2025. Shafali now has a chance to create history. If she scores at least 75 runs in the fifth and final T20I against Sri Lanka on December 30, she will break the world record. Currently, the world record is held by West Indies captain Hayley Matthews, who scored 310 runs in a T20I series in 2023.

TIL GUD AND TRADITIONS: A TASTE OF MAKAR SANKRANTI

This Week, We’re Relishing Til Gud – Simple, Nourishing, and Warmly Traditional!

Til Gud (also known as Tilgul) is a classic Indian winter sweet, deeply associated with Makar Sankranti and widely enjoyed across Maharashtra and other regions. Made with roasted sesame seeds and jaggery, this humble delicacy is celebrated for its earthy flavours, wholesome nutrition, and symbolic message of sweetness and harmony. Prepared especially during colder months, Til Gud provides warmth, energy, and a comforting taste of tradition in every bite.

Ingredients:

- White sesame seeds (Til) – 1 cup
- Jaggery (Gud), grated – ¾ cup
- Ghee – 1 tbsp
- Cardamom powder – ½ tsp

Optional Add-ins (Home-Style Enhancements)

- Roasted peanuts, crushed – 2 tbsp
- Dry coconut (grated) – 2 tbsp



Preparation

1. Dry roast the sesame seeds on low flame until they turn light golden and aromatic. Remove from heat and keep aside to cool.
2. Heat ghee in a heavy-bottom pan. Add grated jaggery and melt it gently on low flame, stirring continuously until it becomes soft and slightly bubbly. Do not overcook.
3. Add roasted sesame seeds, cardamom powder, and optional peanuts and dry coconut to the melted jaggery. Mix thoroughly to combine.
4. Switch off the flame. While the mixture is still warm, grease your palms lightly with ghee and shape the mixture into small, round ladoos.
5. Allow the ladoos to cool completely and set. Store in an airtight container.

Serving Tip:
